The University

Savannah State University is a senior coeducational unit of the University System of Georgia.

- * Founded in 1890,
- * Savannah State University is Georgia's oldest public historically black institution

- * The University System of Georgia's core curriculum is the basis for Savannah State University's degree programs
- * The university, accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, offers 23 undergraduate degree majors and four graduate programs through three colleges:
- -College of Sciences and Technology (COST)
- -College of Business Administration (COBA)
- -College of Liberal Arts and Social Sciences (CLASS)

- * Built in 1901 by students and professors, Hill Hall is listed on the National Register of Historic Places
- The university has one of the lowest student-tofaculty ratios in the region at 22:1
- * Student population grew by 10.6 % in 2009
- * It is estimated that the university will have an enrollment of 5,000 by 2012.

SAVANNAH STATE COLLEGE

This state college was established in 1891 as the Georgia Industrial College for Colored Youths as an outgrowth of the Second Morrill Act of 1890 and an Act of the Georgia General Assembly. November 26, 1890, creating this Institution as one of the original Negro land-grant colleges.

The initial session was held at the Baxter Street School in Athens from June to August, 1891. In October of the same year, the school sessions began on the present site. Its initial educational program was agricultural, mechanical and literary, and by 1898, the college was able to award its first degree.

It was the first public institution of higher learning to be established for Negroes in the state and now is a part of the University System of Georgia. The first president (1891-1921) of the college was Major R. R. Wright who, when just a lad, was asked by General O. O. Howard of the Freedman's Bureau what message should be take back to the people of the North. Young Wright's famous answer was, "Just tell them, we are rising." His answer inspired the poet, John Greenlest Whittier to write the poem. The Little Black Boy of Atlanta."

The Asa H. Gordon Library serves the university and the community. The library has an extensive collection of resources including books, journals, photos, and music. The library offers:

- Web-based catalog access to over six million volumes
- Galileo, an electronic library database of search engines or journals, encyclopedias, magazines and other information offered by the University System of Georgia
- JSTOR, an electronic archive of core scholarly journals in the humanities, social sciences, and sciences, many of which date from the 1800s
- Over a dozen additional electronic databases that cover a wide spectrum of interests
- An extensive African-American collection

The King-Frazier Student Center is an expansive, multi-purpose building strategically located on campus. The multi-cultural student body keeps this building a vibrant center of activity at almost any hour of the day.

There are approximately 75 clubs and organizations on campus that focus on everything from business, sports, arts, politics, environmental or technology. Greek fraternities and sororities also play an active role in campus life. Known as the "Divine Nine," Savannah State is one of the few HBCUs in Georgia to house all nine black sororities and fraternities.
