1 . History and Characteristics

Savannah State University (SSU) is the oldest public historically black college or university in the state of Georgia and the oldest institution of higher learning in the city of Savannah. The school was established in 1890 as a result of the Second Morrill Land Grant Act, which mandated that southern and border states develop land-grant colleges for black students. Later that year, the Georgia General Assembly passed legislation creating the Georgia State Industrial College for Colored Youth, which served as Georgia's 1890 land-grant institution until 1947. The institution opened at its current location in October 1891 with five faculty members and eight students.

Upon the creation of the University System of Georgia (USG) in 1932, the college became one of the first members of the system and its name was changed to Georgia State College. The name changed again in 1950 to Savannah State College, and in 1961, the institution received

full membership in the Southern Association of Colleges. The USG Board of Regents elevated the college to university status in 1996 and renamed the institution Savannah State University.

The institution’s mission is to develop “productive members of a global society through high quality instruction, scholarship, research, service, and community involvement. The university fosters engaged learning and personal growth in a student-centered environment that celebrates the African-American legacy while nurturing a diverse student body.” This mission is achieved through educational programs that are housed in three colleges: Liberal Arts and Social Science, Business Administration, and Sciences and Technology, and the School of Teacher Education. Academic support is provided in units within each of the colleges and the school, as well as the library, the Center for Academic Success, which provides academic advisement and tutoring services, and the Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP) center. Faculty and staff promote internships and mentored research training to prepare students for graduate programs and careers. In addition, the academic enterprise is supported by the Division of Student Affairs with services ranging from career fairs to veterans affairs.

Savannah State University serves a diverse student population: 59% are first-generation; 74% of the undergraduates receive Pell funds; 30% have families with household income of less than \$25,000; and 50% of the entering students expect to work part-time while 15% expect to work full-time while earning a degree.

SSU has an access component to its mission. As such, SSU serves students whose prior academic preparation has left them with less than college-level skills in many areas, as well as those students who have not performed well on standardized tests, specifically the SAT and ACT. As part of the SSU University College and our limited admissions criteria, these students are served by our Center for Academic Success; and most of these student complete co-requisite learning support courses concurrently with college level coursework.

The following table lists all certificate and degree programs currently offered at Savannah State University. For each program offered, the number of graduates is provided for the academic year 2015 – 2016, (July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2016). The Fall 2015 term started on August 10, 2015 and ended on December 3, 2015. The Spring 2016 term started January 10, 2016 and ended on May 15, 2016.

3. Off-Campus Instructional Locations and Branch Campuses

Savannah State University offers courses for three graduate degree programs at the Coastal Georgia Center in downtown Savannah. The facility has been used by SSU since 1998. The three programs offered there are: the Master of Public Administration (MPA); Master of Social Work (MSW); and Master of Science in Urban Studies and Planning (MSUSP). The Coastal Georgia Center is operated by Georgia Southern University and provides meeting space, continuing education classes, graduate courses, distance learning, and professional development classes.

Online education began in the mid 1990's at Savannah State University when the University System of Georgia began allowing all member institutions to provide courses or assistance to USG Distance Learning students and to SSU students taking courses online and offered by other member institutions. The SSU Library aided students in its Distance Learning Center. As reported in the university's 2000 SACSCOC Reaffirmation of Compliance Report, the library had already

begun developing and gathering the resources—electronic transmission of information, computerized database searching, and the online interlibrary loan services—to enable the institution to deliver distance learning courses. [Excerpt from Reaffirmation Report] Other resources included the SSU Library on-line catalog and GALILEO, USG’s digital library. Soon, the university began offering online courses under the title, eLearning. By 2010, SSU’s SACSCOC Reaffirmation of Compliance Report reiterated that SSU’s distance learning program was compatible with that of the other USG member institutions. The university offered several online courses but had yet to develop its first fully online degree program until 2014.

In August 2014, the College of Business Administration (COBA) launched SSU’s first and to date only degree program where 50% or more of the credit hours are delivered through distance education modes. This program, the Bachelor of Business Administration in Management (BBA), can be completed primarily through distance education. Online courses in COBA are the same as courses offered on campus; they are offered on the same semester schedule as on-campus courses and meet the same learning objectives. The identical degree is conferred, whether earned through online courses, on-campus courses, or as a hybrid, with a combination of online and on-campus courses. SSU’s BBA Online program is taught using synchronous and/or asynchronous technology.

Equally important to SSU’s online history is its affiliation with USG’s eCore online program. eCore, beginning in 2014, made the first two years of core courses available to all USG member institution students. Savannah State became an affiliate institution in Spring 2015, whereby SSU students could enroll in eCore online courses. Affiliation with eCore broadened the availability of BBA Online to new students and not only to students who had already earned all core credits. In 2015, a director was appointed to lead the newly formed Online Education Office at SSU.

Savannah State University (SSU) offers coursework for its academic programs through traditional classroom instruction, hybrid, and distance education. SSU does not offer correspondence education—defined by SACSCOC as “courses where instructional materials are provided by mail or electronic transmission.”

Two sources acknowledge the university's origins for online. The first indication of online courses is in the *2005-2007 SSU Catalog*:

Online courses are taken exclusively over the Internet. There are no required on-campus meetings. Hybrid courses are held both on campus and online. They are traditional face-to-face courses in which some of the on-campus class meetings are replaced with online assignments. Web-enhanced courses are traditional face-to-face courses that are augmented by course websites. Unlike the class meetings for hybrid courses, the class meetings for web-enhanced courses are all scheduled on campus unless classes are redirected for special activities. Writing-enhanced courses are those in which the instructor uses writing substantially in the class, and at least 20% of the grade is based on writing assignments.

1.10.3.12 Distributed Learning Committee

The Distributed Learning Committee shall have the authority to approve equipment purchases, to establish operational procedures, and to evaluate the operation of instruction through various distance learning venues (Web-based Internet, Distance Learning, Correspondence, and/or Off Campus Instructional Sites). Members are appointed by the Senate on the recommendation of the Committee on Committees. All members are required to demonstrate that they have completed training workshops in distance learning. The members are eligible for reappointment. The members of the committee will elect a chair.

The committee shall also be charged with assuring that faculty have ready access to adequate library/learning resources and services to support the courses, programs and degrees offered. Additionally, the committee will develop procedures to allow students access to appropriate student development services when they participate in distance learning programs. Finally, the committee will review the Deans' annual evaluative reports on distance learning.

The committee will meet as necessary to assure the growth of service via distance learning while maintaining compliance with SACS' criteria. The committee will report in writing to the Faculty Senate at the November meeting.
