






### **STEM Success Center**

Students sat in on sessions, presented research, and applied their networking skills to build professional connections in education and medicine.



The SSC was able to provide students with several volunteer and community engagement opportunities during Spring 2019. Student groups judged inventions at the Georgia Tech Inventure Prize competition, showcased progress with VEX robotics at Heard elementary, and even assisted with facilitating the SECME Competition with judging, scoring and entertainment.

### Wright Choice Mentoring Program



The Wright Choice (TWC) Mentoring Program of SSU started 2019 with some memorable moments. TWC was able to collaborate with students in the departments of Fine Arts Humanities and Wellness, The College of Teacher Education, Africana Studies, Journalism and Mass Communications, English Languages and Cultures as they shared their scholarship and creativity.

In January, students demonstrated their ability to embody the significance of the atrocities suffered by enslaved Africans, some of whom were undoubtedly on the very grounds Savannah State is built on. Historically it is understood that SSU was once a placenta plantation. Students, faculty and staff gathered in The Marsh View Room for the National Freedom Day kickoff in which students shared "The Unheard Voices: The Slave Narratives". They were joined by students who choreographed dance performances to accompany their "Unheard Voices". Three students were awarded prizes for their essays entitled *Freedom is a Bloody Business*. The evening performances were filmed and live streamed by students in the Mass Communications Department.


The Momentum continued in February as TWC hosted a lecture and panel discussion commemorating the signing of the 13th Amendment with a National Freedom Day Celebration where over 100 students attended. Richard R. Wright, the Founding President of Savannah State University, began this celebration in 1948 as a call for a plan for a New World organization to maintain and safeguard universal peace. Four students engaged with the university's guest lecturer of the day Dr. Teresa Fry Brown as participants in a panel discussion. Dr. Brown is from Emory University where she is a professor. In addition, she is a prolific writer and editor and offered any student who wrote a reflection of the day an opportunity to have their essay published in The Christian Recorder.

TWC continued promoting student success in March giving students opportunities to learn how to make their vision for themselves after graduation into a reality. Guest lecturer Mark Eschoe, a cinematographer, editor and producer, spent quality time with students meeting one on one and mentoring them on "next steps" beyond degree completion. 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Forensic Science Week: The 4th Annual Forensic Science Week was held April 8th-April 13th, 2019. This year's theme was "Who We Are". Led by forensic science students, faculty and industry experts, participants experienced an in-depth look at how the forensic process works. Workshops included Gel Electrophoresis, Substance Analysis, cutting edge technology for DNA profiling RAPIDHIT DNA. The week culminated in a public demonstration of SSU's Rapid HIT DNA analysis machine, which was featured in the Savannah Morning News (View Article Here). As stated in the press feature, the RAPIDHIT DNA instrument was purchased with the Title III grant. SSU students will be trained on this new technology that is expanding to police stations and laboratories around the country.

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





#### **Activity Budget**

- All Activity Directors should be keeping track of their money spent throughout the year. By the end of April, at least 58% of activity funds should be spent or encumbered
- All activity spending is being monitored by the Title III Office. If your activity is flagged as "not spending" funds may be swept from your activity and given to another activity to spend

#### Requests/Approvals

- All echo Travel Authority Requests must be submitted at least (2) WEEKS prior to the travel dates to allow for the appropriate signatures
- Staff and/or Student Employment Contracts must be submitted for approval at least two weeks prior to their official start date. Please note, submission time should take into account the gathering of signatures from:
  - ⇒ Business and Financial Affairs office (all contracts)
  - ⇒ Financial Aid office (student contracts only)
  - ⇒ Human Resources office (all contracts)
    - A background check has to be completed for all new staff contracts before they can begin
- Business and Financial Affairs Office has closed the PeopleSoft system for Year-End
  - ⇒ Following the online purchasing system shutdown, please submit all requests for upcoming Title III purchases manually via the paper procurement form through July 2019 —Your department may retrieve the procurement forms from the Title III Office
  - ⇒E-Procurement/Manual Procurement Please submit all payment requests for Registration, Membership, Supplies, etc. via the electronic/manual procurement form
  - ⇒Check Requests Please submit check requests for Hotel payments

#### **Title III Office**

- Phase I Data is being collected in preparation for submission to the Department of Education. This data determines Title III's funding level for the upcoming budget period (October 2019 - September 2020)
- Mid-Year Reports and Equipment Inventory Reports (October 2018- March 2019) were due to the Title III Office on April 12th.
- All Title III related reports should be submitted on time. Failure to comply will result in funds being held until all reports have been received.

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
